Using Our Voices to Teach About the Holocaust

The world's Jewish population was reduced by one third, from roughly 16.6 million in 1939 to 11 million in 1946. At Beth Shalom, we joined many across the world by using our voices to teach about the Holocaust to share stories of survivors and make sure it is part of our future generations curriculum. Rabbi Dovid Krautwirth gave a class on the Holocaust to our older students. Clips of a personal blog, based on a true story called "Eva Stories" were shown to our students as part of this week's curriculum, which brought about some phenominal questions and positivity about being Jewish today. Lastly, a heartfelt thank you to Mrs. Cutler and Mrs. Leiter for coming in to share about the Holocaust. The children intently listened and asked wonderful questions. It was a meaningful event for all of us in the audience.

A Peek Into Our Classrooms

• Morah Bracha's 1-6

1st-6th grade started learning about Pirkei Avos, mishnah 1 and 2. We discussed about having a pleasant and welcoming face when greeting people. We also learned about being dan I'kaf zechus (judging favorably), and not jumping to conclusions. In Mishnah 2, we learned about not getting angry easily, and treating friends with kavod (respect). We discussed the importance of appreciating what others do for us, and expressing gratitude. Every act of kindness is a mitzvah, and a mitzvah helps add a brick to the Beis HaMikdash, may it be re-built speedily and in our days!

• Miss Christina's K-1

Our theme is Spring. K-1 kicked off National Poetry month by completing ice cream flavor alliteration poems! We also enjoyed creating name acrostic poems as well. K-1 students were bursting with creativity and figured how to engineer and design tissue paper kites—using straws, masking tape,—yarn, and tissue paper! Earth Day is on Saturday, April 22, 2023, and level 1 created a writing project on ways in which we can help the Earth. In addition, both K-1 accepted the math challenge to begin "writing" their numbers up to 1,000! Within the next upcoming weeks, check out our progress and watch us soar to infinite heights!

• Mrs. Belluzzi's 2-6

Exciting things are happening in Mrs. Belluzzi's social studies and language arts classes! Levels 3 and 4 have been studying the differences between the early United States and our nation today. Our learning focus of the week was the Louisiana Purchase of 1803, during Thomas Jefferson's Presidency. We compared and contrasted the United States of 1803 versus the United States of today, paying particular care to land acquisition, immigration, and population growth.

This week in Mrs. Belluzzi's reading class, students worked on the 'buddy sounds' EY as in "key", WR as in "wrench" and UI as in "fruit." Students also learned about the apostrophe and how it replaces letters and joins words together.

Middle school students began a new unit in language arts; the study of folktales, fables, and myths. What universal themes and symbols can be spotted across various world cultures within these interesting stories? Students read and discussed the opening excerpt from A Single Shard, a Korean folktale adapted by Linda Sue Park. In social studies, we continued our studies of American history. Who were the 'Breaker Boys'? What would life be like in the U.S. if child labor laws hadn't been put into place?

Pre-K Classroom

This week in PreK, our theme was Safe Hands. We read books, did activities, and discussed different ways we can use our hands safely. We collaborated as a team to create a beautiful Har Sinai bulletin board, where we attach a new flower every day as we continue our Sefirat Haomer count for Shavuot. The children enjoyed decorating and cutting the flowers, painting the Har Sinai Mountain, and the best davener of the day gets to add that days flower! We also started learning the story of Rebbi Akiva, a simple shepherd boy who didn't even know the Aleph Beis. Our PreK friends were so proud to sing the Aleph Beis song to our Rebbi Akiva puppet to show how well they know their Aleph Beis! We got to enjoy some sensory play with cotton balls, loving the texture, ripping it, squishing it, rolling it around, and ultimately decorating our sheep pictures with it. Using safe hands was incorporated throughout the week, and the children are really enjoying coming up with new ways to use our hands safely, like a group trip to the sinks to wash our hands because safe hands means using our hands to take care of our own bodies too.








































Parsha Questions

- 1. What is the main topic of Parshas Tazria?
- 2. What is the main topic of Parshas Metzora?
- 3. What is one reason that some might get tzara'as?
- 4. What does tzara'as look like?
- 5. What happens once spots are seen?
- 6. What is the process of taharah (purification)?
- 7. What is a famous example of Lashon Hara in the Torah?

Parsha Answers

- 1. Tazria discusses the different types of tzara'as.
- 2. Metzora discusses the process of taharah (purification) from tzara'as.
- 3. By speaking Lashon Hara.
- 4. White spots they can be on clothing, house or body
- 5. Once the Kohen judges that it is in fact *tzaraas*, the person has to leave the *Machaneh Yisrael* area for a week; no one can speak to or come near them. The person had to reflect on his actions and do *teshuvah*; after a week the Kohen will come check to see if the *tzara'as* has healed; if so the person begins the process of *taharah* (purification). If it has not healed, the person must wait another week and check again.
- 6. The person has to clean his clothing and remove all hair from body. Additionally, two birds are brought by the Kohen, to represent that a person who speaks *Lashon Hara* is like a bird that chirps and chirps. One of the birds is slaughtered and blood is put into the water that the Kohen brought, and then the mixture is sprinkled 7 times on the back of the hands of the person.

Wishing a *refuah sheleimah* to our beloved friend Rika Schaffer. Our students created get well cards and painted rocks this week.




