# Teacher Interview 1/2

Mr. Ari Leiter

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- What is your position here at BSA? Director of Student Affairs, but I am here to help facilitate a happy and safe environment for students and staff who want to come everyday and grow, educationally and intellectually, and be happy productive members of society.
- Do you teach in the classroom? Yes, I teach Ivrit and Math, and sub when needed to help facilitate continuity in education to the students. I see that at BSA, the kids want to learn and they are happy to be there, and it is not a rigid environment ,which is so exciting on a daily basis.
- What is it like being back in Scranton where you grew up? It's surreal. It's strange in a way and great in a way. One of my siblings, Dov, actually had his wedding in Beth Shalom. His Chosson's Tish was in the library and the wedding was upstairs in the shul, and the reception in the social hall. It will be 35 years this Memorial Day Weekend. I also used to *leyn* at Beth Shalom for years, and just being there on a daily basis is a weird experience. Just driving though Scranton brings up a lot of memories. It's also so amazing to be back and see Dr. Ackerman teaching. He was the first math teacher that explained things so clearly to me, and I love sitting in on his classes. He is top notch and BSA is lucky to have him.
- What makes a great teacher? Wanting to improve yourself, and by the same token, wanting to improve students and have happy children. They should want to get up and learn something new each day, even if it is just one thing that they didn't know yesterday. It's not so much how much you teach, but that your students are happy learning. Someone once said to me years ago at work, "Leiter, you're always smiling," and I said "Well, the alternative is to not smile or cry, and that's no fun." To sum it up, a good teacher enables and facilitates a student to grow and thrive.
- What do you like most about teaching? Enabling and facilitating the children being happy and through happiness, they can be productive members of society.

# **Teacher Interview 2/2**

Mr. Ari Leiter

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- What is a memory that sticks out in your years of education? A few years ago, I was outside of Quick Check, and this man came up to me and said, "Do you remember me?" I said, "No." He said, "I'm Michael King." He was in my first class and it must have been 20 years later, and he remembered me. I only had him for homeroom and never taught him a thing, but I must have made an impression on him. It meant a lot to me. Another memory that sticks out is that I had a student who was challenging all year, and when we were getting ready for graduation practice, she said, "Mr., you have great eyes'." It wasn't the compliment about the eyes that meant so much to me but that you can never know what a student is thinking. You never know what an impression you are making on a student on a daily basis, by the way you carry yourself and by the way you react to their behaviors.
- Can you describe your worst teaching day and something you have learned from it? I used to get very nervous when we would have observations in the classroom. Then one day I thought, "Why am I nervous? I do what I do everyday and I know it's good, so be it." I felt so much better from that day forward, but it took years to get to that. So it is not really about my worst day, but actually an experience that I thought was bad and then changed my mindset on it.
- What do you feel is most important for students to take from their learning experiences? They should be happy and have a sense of accomplishment. Once again, they shouldn't just learn history or math and walk away with just that. They should be able to walk away with a sense of accomplishment. What happens when you accomplish something? You can feel good about yourself and then make others feel good.
- Can you share with us a funny childhood memory with Dr. Russi Leiter-Itzkowitz? Russi is my youngest sibling and when my mom was expecting her, I was very excited! I am not an artist, but at the time, I did an art project and I cut out the words "baby." I glued them together and sholacked it, and I couldn't wait for her to be born to give it to her. I guess it comes full circle, with yes, it is weird to be back in Scranton, but also amazing to be able to work with Russi and everyone.


